Additional information

To ensure we establish a process that is aligned to industry standards we undertook a gap analysis against the ISO20400 Sustainable Procurement Guidance Standard in 2018.

This allowed us to identify key areas to enhance our approach to sustainable/responsible procurement. We have now embedded sustainability considerations into our sourcing process to ensure relevant criteria are included in our engagement with the supply chain.

We use the Achilles UVDB (Utilities Vendor Database) to pre-qualify our suppliers and undertake Verification audits of our suppliers to ensure compliance with our standards.

National Grid has taken a leading position in many areas to drive the sustainability agenda through the supply chain and is using its influence as a client to support several collaborative industry initiatives and commitments including the EU Procurement Skills Accord, CDP Supply Chain Climate Change program, the Achilles UVDB working group, the Construction Protocol and the United Nations Global Compact (UNGC) working group to address modern slavery amongst others. We also work collaboratively with our peers and suppliers to ensure we are aligned on requirements and drive positive change.

We attend conferences and networking events to continually inform our position and share best practice/benchmark our approach in these areas.
